




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
A long time ago, in the 1700s, Mercy Otis Warren grew up in Barnstable, Massachusetts.

He helped Mercy's brother Jemmy get ready for college.


Mercy wanted to learn too, and she begged her father to let her go with Jemmy. And he agreed!

Mercy didn't like the King's rules either. She thought the people who lived in America should be able to make their own rules.






Mercy and James worked together with them at the kitchen table, thinking of ideas to help America become a free country. They were known as the Sons of Liberty.
